
cents for doublesided) to make copies.


### **Code Club Begins February 1**

## The Mystery of the General in the Ground

Reverend Michael Shine was pastor of St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Plattsmouth from 1908 until his death in 1927. The good padre was a noted Nebraska historian, in fact Vice-President of the Nebraska State Historical Society at the time of his passing.

But our story begins, not with a Catholic Priest, but with a Baptist missionary. In 1833, Moses and Eliza Merrill were sent by the Baptist Mission Board in Boston to the Indian Agency in Bellevue, future Nebraska Territory. There, about six miles southwest of the agency, they established the first mission in Nebraska "to bring salvation and education" to the Otoe Indians, who were lead by Chief Iotan. Moses died of tuberculosis at the age of 36 in 1840. Eliza and the couple's young son returned east, and the mission was abandoned.

Time passed, and the mission's exact location was forgotten. That is, until the Nebraska State Historical Society heard rumors, as the *Lincoln Star* reported, "that the chimney of the mission was believed to be standing in the location described by Rev. Merrill in his diary, four miles west and four miles south of Bellevue, and three miles west from the old town of La Platte." The historical society appointed an ad hoc committee of four to locate that chimney and any ruins of the mission that may remain. Rev. Shine was one of the members.

They found the Merrill mission house being used as a storage shed "in an ordinary farm yard pig pen." The committee found their objective

on Sunday June 15, 1913, and reported back to the Society that not only was the original chimney standing, but the original house also. The group found that the log house was built at the same time the chimney was built, and that the measurements and description matched Merrill and Eliza's description of their mission. The search party found two cottonwood log cabins separated by the stone chimney, which was six feet square at its base and stood 20 feet tall. The two cabins, each 16 by 16 feet, had since been connected by boards, making a structure overall of 16 by 40 feet. Apparently the chimney was used only indirectly by one of the cabins.

Three large, ancient cottonwood trees stood nearby. The ad hoc group measured one of these with a circumference of 15 feet. In one of her letters Eliza described planting cottonwood trees around their mission home. Also nearby, the committee found a small, unnamed creek which they immediately dubbed "Merrill Creek."

It was a beautiful site, and the Society expressed a wish to acquire the site as "one of the most valuable historic spots in Nebraska." Unfortunately, nothing much came of that desire.

Rev. Shine was tapped for the Society's ad hoc investigative group due to his publication a few months earlier of *The Nebraska Aborigines as they Appeared in the Eighteenth Century*, one of his most significant research efforts and one that established him as Nebraska's then preeminent expert on the state's original inhabitants.

The State Historical Society turned to Rev. Shine when, in 1916, as the Plattsmouth Journal reported,


The skeleton of a man clothed in the uniform of a general of the United States army was unearthed while plowing a field near the old mission. ... The body had been buried on a hillside, not a great way from the mission, and the plow, in digging into the grave, had disarranged the skeleton, but the many interesting relics that would prove of value in identification remained. A large number of small bells, which had evidently been fastened on the uniform with thongs of rawhide, were found, while a number of bracelets of copper and brass were lying in the grave, having evidently been the ornaments of the person who was buried there, and these bracelets were decorated with hand filings in the copper with a crude attempt at ornamentation. All of the rings and bracelets found were of very crude make and green with the marks of time that they had lain in the grave. There were also several stings of beads of blue and white in the grave, denoting the importance of the body that had been unearthed, while the most striking feature of the find was the fact that the tattered remnants of an old uniform coat of the United States army was found, the brass buttons and the gold epaulets being in a very good state of preservation, and for a short time creating the impression that the body was that of some army officer who had been killed by the Indians.

There was no record of a high ranking army officer being buried in southern Sarpy County. The items found in the grave also indicated that the deceased was not a white man.

Rev. Shine cleared up the mystery when he identified the body as that of Chief lotan of the Otoe. The mission had been located by the Merrills' near the Chief's Otoe village. But the question remained, why the general's uniform?

In September 1833, Commissioner of Indian Affairs Henry Ellsworth held a council with the Otoe-Missouria (the tribes had united about ten years earlier), of whom lotan was the primary chief. Ellsworth's objective was to convince the tribe to sell their land between the Big and Little Nemaha Rivers. A deal was struck, but not before many presents were handed out, including a general's uniform to lotan from "the Great White Father at Washington."

In 1837, Otoe Indian Agent Dougherty wrote in a report to Indian Superintendent William Clark of Lewis & Clark fame, "About the last of April the principal Otoe Chief [lotan] and two of his young men got into a dispute concerning a couple of young squaws, which ended in the death of laton [sic] and four others. The laton was the only chief of worth in the tribe and it is much to be regretted that whiskey should have been the cause of the




Chief lotan of the Otoe (about 1821)


death of so noble a chief. It appears from all that I can learn that he, in a drunken frolic, got into a difficulty..."

Rev. Shine concluded his assessment "The chief was attired in a bright blue coat with red facings and liberally decorated with large brass buttons and gold braid, ... of which he was very proud." Reverend Shine would be called upon again from time to time to solve Nebraska history mysteries.
