# Julia Again and That Building

Last month (March), we wrote about a photograph that Kevin Evans posted in the Plattsmouth Memory Lane Facebook group. That was a photo of Julia C. Dwyer's millinery store, which sold ladies hats and accessories. We speculated that that store was located on South Sixth Street. Margo, up at the museum, found a photograph in *Beautiful Plattsmouth* that offers more convincing evidence that Kevin's photo is of Julia's shop on North Sixth Street. That leads us off on a couple of tangents.

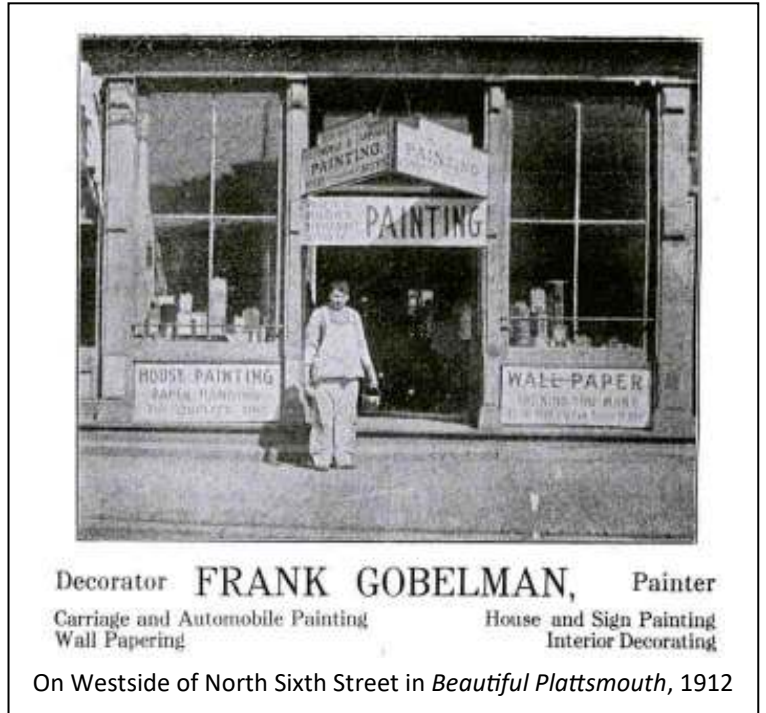
Both the South and North Sixth Street buildings are in the Commercial Italianate architectural style, popular in the 1870s and '80s. In this style, storefronts were mostly glass for lighting the interior and displaying goods, and pseudo-columns framed those windows. There are other characteristics, but these two serve our purpose to show that the two buildings are similar in style.

The second storefront photo, taken around 1913, shows Gobelman occupying both business bays of the building (that's probably Frank sitting in the doorway).

First, a little background. According to the Sanborn Fire Insurance Map for 1885, there was a one-story structure at this location; however, by 1888, a two-story structure occupied the site. In 1899, Israel Pearlman bought the lots on which the building stood, at a Sheriff's sale for the back taxes due. In 1911, Pearlman sold the lots to Jacob Falter, who in 1914 sold the lots to Plattsmouth Lodge, No. 739, Benevolent Protective Order of Elks.

At which point in time, the building was transformed, as described by the *Plattsmouth Journal*:

[T]he Pearlman building on North Sixth Street, just north of the Coates' block [Fitzgerald Building], has been purchased by the Plattsmouth lodge of Elks and will be transferred by them into a club house. ... The building will be moved back from its present location some twelve feet and will be raised four feet from the lot level and a fine porch will be built the height of the building on the west, which will add greatly to the appearance of the structure. The first floor of the building will be devoted to the reading and lounging rooms, committee and cloak rooms .... The roof of the building will be raised several feet and the lodge rooms placed on this floor and in addition a large hall that can be used for dancing or social gatherings will be constructed. ... The building will be brick veneered all over...

In 1939, the property passed from the Elks Lodge to Erna Lapidus, who owned the nearby Riley Hotel. With the advent of World War Two, it appears she converted the building to apartments for defense workers in Bellevue. That is how we see it today, with minor changes by Erna, such as the centered stairs to the front porch.

Another tangent: *Beautiful Plattsmouth* was published by the *Plattsmouth Journal* without a date (historians hate that). Serendipitously, however, it contains a write-up about Julia's shop on South Sixth Street, where she was located twice, in June 1907 and in 1912. Julia's write-up states, "Mrs. Dwyer's Spring opening, which began Wednesday, April 3, was a big success." From this and Frank Gobelman's business location in *Beautiful Plattsmouth*, we can pin the publication date to 1912 or (not very likely) early 1913.

Returning to 1910: in last month's column, we mentioned that O.P. Monroe terminated Julia's lease because he needed the space to expand his furniture business. Why, then, were both store fronts occupied by Gobelman in 1913?

Monroe was leasing the building for his business and living quarters from Israel Pearlman and, after 1911, from Charles Parmele. In turn, Monroe subleased the north business bay to Julia, as evidenced by the doorway between the bays. When Monroe unexpectedly died in August 1913, Gobelman replaced him until the building was purchased by the Elks in late 1913, and he had to relocate in early 1914.

That left a very narrow window of time for not just one, but two photographs of Gobelman's enterprise, which we see here.

That's probably Frank sitting in the doorway. The doorway between the lady and man led to stairs to the second floor. Julia would have occupied the left business bay from 1907 to 1910. The *Plattsmouth Journal's* competitor, the *News-Herald*, on its last legs, was briefly in the building during 1911.

### Tasha suggests the show **Cobra Kai**

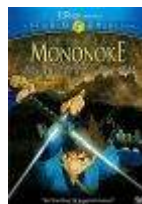


Thirty years after their final clash at the 1984 All Valley Karate Tournament, Johnny Lawrence is at his lowest point as a jobless

### Kenneth suggests the movie **Princess Mononoke**

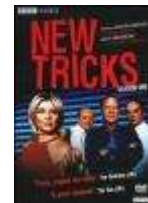
When a frightening creature attacks his remote village, young warrior Ashitaka is able to put the great beast out of its misery.
